

The Anglo-Saxon Chronicle

Chronicle

Late ninth century (King Alfred the Great)

Established literary genre

Yearly record of events, similar to a diary

• The year 1 AD – 1154 (AD)

• Short or long(er) entries





Anglo-Saxon Chronicle

- Collective title for number of chronicles
- Written quite independently by several authors
- Often written about the same events
- Also local events have been recorded
- Some information is not reliable:
- Dated in the wrong year
- Based on rumours
- Very important source of knowledge about English history

Christianity

 First based on the works of e.g. Venerable Bede, genealogical lists, possibly oral sources

- Chronicles written by monks
 - Anonymous
 - Business-like manner
- Written in Old English
 - Later entries in Middle English

1066 Battle of Hastings

- Around Michaelmas (feast of St. Michael: 28 or 29 September)
- Around 7000 French soldiers landed on the Sussex coast
- The last time in history that England was successfully invaded
- End to Anglo-Saxon rule, start of Norman rule
- Previous king (Edward the Confessor) had died
- William, Duke of Normandy –
 William the Conqueror



Peterborough Chronicle

Written in Old English with hints to Middle English

Language is something that evolves

 Gives an account of a lot of events that happened:

Kings at war, the numbers of ships,
 armies, the victory of William the Conqueror, etc.
