




Alfred, King of Wessex (849-899) Alfred the Great

- Defeated (part of) Danish Vikings
- Negotiated a treaty (Danelaw)
- Reorganised the Anglo-Saxon army
- Issued ships to be built: start of the British Royal Navy
- Scholar: he promoted literacy
- Translation plan: translate Latin works into Old English
- TV series: The Last Kingdom Vikings

Alfred, King of Wessex (849-899)

Danelaw



Venerable Bede (672-735)

- See previous lesson
- Wrote a large work on the development of Christianity in Britain
- Translated into Old English by King Alfred
- One of the stories he wrote is about:



Saint Oswald, King of Northumbria (604-642)

Explanation of text – page 6 – paragraph 1

- A bishop converted Oswald and his people to Christianity
- Therefore he would go to Heaven after his death
- His forefathers did not have the same religion...
- God made sure that King Oswald received a larger country to govern than any of his ancestors had ever had (because he was a Christian now)

Explanation of text – page 6 – paragraph 2

Oswald was a powerful king who ruled a large country. Yet he:

- was wonderfully humble
- kind
- generous to the poor or strangers
- very religious (= pious) in the text he receives a bishop at his table and they want to say a prayer before they eat.

Explanation of text – page 6 – paragraph 2


- Right before they pray an officer comes in
- Officer has to take care of poor and needy people
- King Oswald gives away the food on his table
- Bishop Aiden is very impressed and blesses him (his hand and arm)
- Pious = very religious and in line with the will of God
- After Oswald dies in battle in 642 the hand and arm are 'rescued', they are kept as a relic in Bamburgh Castle, England.
